






Cuban Rhythms

December 3-8, 2024

Since Christopher Columbus declared Cuba part of the Spanish Empire in 1492, the island has served as a way station of New World wealth on its way across the Atlantic, a playground of American mob bosses and literati, and a tropical outpost of communism. The story of its past is told in the streets of its soulful cities, where Russian-made Ladas buzz alongside classic American cars and majestic façades now stand in various states of decay or restoration. Amid this tableau that seems frozen in time, Cuban creativity is alive and thriving. Join the Chautauqua Institution for an in-depth exploration of contemporary Cuba, hearing the unique perspectives of artists and entrepreneurs, farmers and dancers, urban planners, and political experts. During six fascinating days in and around Havana, visit family homes as well as important historic sites, enjoy private performances by renowned musicians and dance companies, and meet artists in their studios. Through panel discussions with local experts and interactions with everyday Cubans, gain insights into a rich and storied culture and the challenges and joys of life in Cuba.

Itinerary

Day 1: Bienvenidos a Havana

Arrive at Havana's Jose Marti International Airport and transfer to your boutique hotel*, a historic residential neighborhood filled with elegantly restored mansions. Meet your fellow travelers for an orientation from your tour staff followed by a festive welcome dinner featuring local flavors. Experience a captivating performance by Primera Linea, a youth band which fuses music from New Orleans and Cuba.

Day 2: History of Havana

Meet with Cuba's top urban planner this morning to gain insights into the cultural, political, and socioeconomic factors that are influencing the city's evolution—and the challenges that historic preservationists face bringing this enchanting city into the future. Witness a private classical musical performance. After a traditional Cuban lunch in a renowned paladar, or privately-run restaurant, set out on a walking tour of Old Havana. Exploring in small groups, you'll have a chance to interact with families and entrepreneurs, visiting private homes and businesses to get an inside look at daily life in the city. Cap off the day with visits to the home studios of world-renowned and up-and-coming artists.

Day 3: Hemingway, and Hip Hop

Tour the home of Ernest Hemingway at Finca Vigia, where the author penned *For Whom the Bell Tolls* and *The Old Man and the Sea*. Then travel to an urban farm on the outskirts of Havana. Sit down to a farm-to-table lunch and learn about the role of small, community-run gardens in addressing food scarcity issues in the wake of the collapse of the Soviet Union—once Cuba's main supplier of agricultural products. This afternoon, meet La Reyna y La Real, a Havana-born female rap duo that is pushing the boundaries of gender and race in the Cuban hip-hop scene. This evening, gather for a reception at Café Madrigal, the art-filled home of filmmaker Rafael Rosales, where you'll exchange with writers and artists over cocktails followed by a cigar tasting with a local expert.

Day 4: Cuba's Natural Beauty

Depart for day trip to Soroa, named "the rainbow of Cuba" a UNESCO Biosphere Reserve (approximately 90 minutes from Havana). This small oasis located in the Rosario Mountain Range features beautiful trails, coffee plantations, rivers, and waterfalls. This visit will include a visit to an orchid garden, a guided hike through a natural reserve, and a farm-to-table lunch. Though the hike is not particularly strenuous, it is two hours in length. Travelers should be physically fit enough to be able to walk for two hours (with breaks) on terrain that is not completely flat. Return to Havana in the late afternoon. Keep the natural beauty of the day flowing into the evening during a rooftop jam session with local musicians.

Day 5: The Arts Revealed

Participate in a panel discussion with top Cuban experts in politics, entrepreneurship, economics, and foreign policy. Then head to the Museum of Cuban Art for a private tour led by art historians. This afternoon, pay a special visit to the Malpaso Dance Company headquarters with Fernando Saez, meeting with dancers and learning about the global influences that have shaped the style of this renowned troupe. Attend a dance lesson to learn to the moves of one of Cuba's most famous dances such as salsa, folklore, or other traditional rhythms, or try your hand at Afro-Cuban percussion. Celebrate your journey at one of Havana's top *paladars*.



*Boutique hotels are privately and independently run by Cuban citizens rather than by the Cuban government. Each hotel only has 8-11 rooms. As such, with a maximum group size of 25, our group will likely utilize two hotels. They are all similar caliber and located in the same neighborhood. These former colonial mansions turned into full-service hotels are not only compliant with the US regulations on travel to Cuba but capture the charm and mystique of a bygone era. Specific boutique hotel assignments will be announced closer to departure. (5 nights)
