This is a true story about Porfirio Rubirosa, Ian Fleming's inspiration for Bond, and a young Dominican actor-to-be, whose discovery of "Rubi" shakes his very foundation. Set to a live percussion score and immersive projections, *The Real James Bond...Was Dominican* is a young man's guide to love, color, code-switching, white-washing, success, fake-it-till-you-make-it, and the roller coaster of finding one's true self.

This production contains mild language usage, discussions of racism, colorism, and mild sexual content.

Recommended for audiences ages 13 and older.




Christopher Rivas

Playwright/Performer

Christopher Rivas is an acclaimed writer, actor and storyteller whose work spans theater, literature and film — with a focus on identity, history and untold narratives. His critically celebrated solo play, The Real James Bond...Was Dominican, has toured theaters across the country, engaging audiences with its dynamic storytelling and powerful exploration of race, masculinity and cultural erasure.

Rivas is currently the artist-in-residence at Arizona State University (ASU) for the next three years, where he continues to develop new works that challenge and inspire. His book Brown Enough has received national recognition, becoming required reading in classrooms and curriculum across the country, solidifying its place as an essential exploration of Latinidad, belonging, and race in America.

His latest book, You're a Good Swimmer, tells the story of conception without gendered terms, and is inclusive of all family dynamics. Additionally, his play Rough Magic, starring Annie Gonzalez, is

being adapted into a feature film produced by Eva Longoria and Luz Films, while the stage version continues to generate buzz. The book adaptation of Rough Magic is set for release in 2025, further expanding its impact across multiple mediums.

Beyond his literary and theatrical success, Rivas is actively developing high-profile film and podcast projects, including a collaboration with ESPN's "30 for 30." With an expansive body of work and momentum across publishing, film and theater, Rivas is at the forefront of powerful, intersectional storytelling that redefines representation in the industry.




Jonathan Gomez

Jonathan Gomez is a percussionist, composer and arranger born in Bogota, Colombia. There is no question why he has been able to take traditional Colombian music to popular venues around the U.S. His musical career began at the age of 5 at "Orquesta Sinfonica Juvenil de Colombia," then continued at the "Pontificia Universidad Javeriana" where he gained a better understanding of world music. He has performed in renowned festivals, such as Globalfest, Music of Colors (Detroit) and SXSW (Austin, Texas), among others. Jonathan has an extensive career in the salsa scene in Colombia as part of "La Real Charanga," recording two productions and taking first place in "Salsa al Parque" and "Jazz al Parque." He has had the opportunity to play and record with many well-known artists, such as Luisito Carrión, Luis Felipe Gonzalez, Luis Fonsi, Daddy Yankee, Kader Japonaise & Shwekey. 
Daniel Banks

Daniel Banks is a director, deviser, dance dramaturg, and community organizer. He is a director, deviser, dance dramaturg, and community organizer. He is co-founder/co-curator of DNAWORKS, an arts and service organization dedicated to dialogue and healing through the arts. DNAWORKS centers Global Majority and LGBTQQ2SPIAA+voices and experiences to create more complex representations of identity, culture, class, and heritage through theatre, dance, film, writing, and art installation. He has directed, led workshops, and/or instigated projects in 39 states and 23 countries at such venues as the Belarussian National Drama Theatre, the NYC and DC Hip Hop Theatre Festivals, The Market Theater Lab (South Africa), McCarter Theatre Center, National Theatre of Uganda, the Oval House and Theatro Technis (UK), PlayMakers Rep, Playhouse Square, Dallas Theatre Center, ArtsEmerson, City Theater, and The Public Theater.

Daniel served as choreographer/movement director for productions at New York Shakespeare Festival/Shakespeare in the Park, Theatre for a New Audience, Singapore Repertory Theatre, La Monnaie/De Munt (Belgium), and Salzburger Landestheater (Austria), as well as for Maurice Sendak's company The Night Kitchen. Daniel served on the dramaturgical team for Camille A. Brown & Dancers' Black Girl: Linguistic Play and ink and directed DNAWORKS touring productions HaMapah/The Map and HaMapah/The Map Dance-on-Film, choreographed and performed by DNAWORKS Co-Founder Adam W. McKinney; Hollow Roots by Christina Anderson; and The Real James Bond...Was Dominican by and with Christopher Rivas. His art installation work includes Shelter in Place and HaMapah, both with McKinney. Current projects in development include The Secret Sharer (premiering April 2026 at ArtsEmerson), We the Messiah, and to (my)chemo, with love.

Daniel is co-convener and board co-chair of Transform 1012 N. Main Street, the project to repurpose the former Ku Klux Klan Auditorium in Fort Worth, Texas, into The Fred Rouse Center for Arts and Community Healing. He serves on the Drama League's Directors Council and is associate director of Theatre Without Borders. He has published numerous articles and chapters on Hip Hop Theatre, Applied Theatre, and casting, is editor of Say Word! Voices from Hip Hop Theater (Univ. of Michigan Press), and co-editor with Dr. Claire Syler of Casting a Movement: The Welcome Table Initiative (Routledge). Daniel is the 2020 recipient of Theatre Communications Group's Alan Schneider Director Award, a MacDowell fellow, and a member of the College of Fellows of the American Theatre.








Kelly Colburn




Sebastian Zavalza




